Kay graduated from East Carolina University School of Art with a Bachelor of Science degree in Art Education. She decided after graduation that she wanted to be a children's book illustrator. She moved outside of New York City and decided to print her own book. To learn more about the process and get some experience, she accepted a position at a small commercial printing company in Darien, Connecticut. She also worked as a Graphic Designer for over 35 years, creating logos,

brochures, and other artwork. She had very unique experiences working for Dow Jones in the composing room of The Wall Street Journal. She was working in the newsroom on the night the first bomb hit Kuwait, which started Desert Storm. She says it was "very eerie to be on the newsroom floor that night. Most of the people working there were Vietnam Vets and we all knew what war really meant. Everyone was silent as we waited for reports to come in. I think you could've heard a pin drop." Currently Kay works as a freelance graphic designer. Kay also paints with acrylics and says she loves living in the Savannah art community, as it's a rich environment full of innovative, creative people and the opportunities are endless for artistic growth. Kay is also an air force brat. Her father was a West Virginia Hillbilly and her mother was from Bergerac, France. She's traveled all over the world throughout her life, but grew up mostly in Delaware. However, Savannah, with its tidal creeks and easy access to the beach, make her feel right at home.

While in Western Massachusetts, Kay volunteered as a docent in an 1800's historical house. She reintroduced local history into the fourth grade public school curriculum, gave classroom presentations, wrote a booklet, The Westfield Story, and supervised the production of a video to complement the program. This is still being used as a requirement for regional history education.

Continuing with her writing success and creative nature, Kay also managed to publish four young adult paranormal books, all which take place in Savannah. Her books: Wicked Haints, Dead Man's Fingers, Zombies Y'all, and Heels & Souls,

Her next three books were published by Vinspire Publishing, located outside of Charleston. She's excited to be working with them because they understand and appreciate her southern humor. Kay is currently working on her next book, Claire Buoyant; a Ghost Ship.
